

DIWALI-THE FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS

The five-day long festival originated in the Indian subcontinent and is mentioned in early Sanskrit texts. The common celebratory practices are common as festival of light, however there are minor differences from state to state in India. Diwali/Dewali/Deepavali is usually celebrated twenty days after the Vijayadashami (Dussehra, Dasara, Dashain, Dashahara) festival, with **Dhanteras**, or the regional equivalent, marking the first day of the festival when celebrants prepare by cleaning their homes and making decorations on the floor, such as *rangolis*. Some regions of India start Diwali festivities the day before Dhanteras with Govatsa Dwadashi. The second day is Naraka Chaturdashi. The third day is the day of Lakshmi Puja and the darkest night of the traditional month. In some parts of India, the day after Lakshmi Puja is marked with the Govardhan Puja and Balipratipada (Padwa). Some Hindu communities mark the last day as Bhai Dooj or the regional equivalent, which is dedicated to the bond between sister and brother, while other Hindu and Sikh craftsmen communities mark this day as Vishwakarma Puja and observe it by performing maintenance in their work spaces and offering prayers.




















NO BAG DAY CLASS 6 TO 8

The activities created awareness in students, satiated their curiosity and at the end of the day the students left the area with a desire to know various concepts related to the subject. Their take home activity was an aeroplane using an A4 sheet. Different mechanisms present in the wings of an aeroplane were explicitly explained during the demonstration when the students were asked to make a few changes to their paper planes. The youngsters thoroughly enjoyed deploying their planes to see the result of the changes made. On the whole a delightful escapade for the students.

WORLD POSTAL DAY

World Post Day is an international day that occurs each year on October 9, the anniversary of the Universal Postal Union (UPU),^[1] which started in 1874 in Switzerland. The UPU was the start of the global communications revolution, introducing the ability to write letter to others all over the world. World Post Day started in 1969. Since then, countries all over the world take part in celebrations to highlight the importance of the postal service. Many things happen on this day. Post offices in some countries hold special stamp collection exhibitions; there are open days at postal measures and there are workshops on postal history. The UPU organizes an international letter writing competition for young people. Since 1969, UPU announces the annual best postal services of the year on the 9 October.^[11] Postal systems have been in operation for many centuries.

GLOBAL HANDWASHING DAY

October 15 is Global Handwashing Day, a global advocacy day dedicated to increasing awareness and understanding about the importance of handwashing with soap as an effective and affordable way to prevent diseases and save lives.

Global Handwashing Day was founded by the <u>Global</u> <u>Handwashing Partnership</u>, and is an opportunity to design, test, and replicate creative ways to encourage people to wash their hands with soap at critical times.

The first Global Handwashing Day was held in 2008, when over 120 million children around the world washed their hands with soap in more than 70 countries.

WORLD SPINE DAY

The theme emphasizes diversity of spinal pain and disability as part of the global burden of disease and addresses the need for access to quality essential spinal health services worldwide. With an estimated 540 million people in the world suffering with low back pain at any one time, it remains the leading cause of years lived with disability.



WORLD STATISTICS DAY

The third World Statistics Day will be celebrated around the globe on 20 October 2020 with the theme "<u>Connecting the world</u> with data we can trust." This theme reflects the importance of trust, authoritative data, innovation and the public good in national statistical systems.

The celebration of World Statistics Day 2020 is a global collaborative endeavour, organized under the guidance of the <u>United Nations Statistical Commission</u>.

The <u>Statistics Division</u> of the <u>United Nations Department of</u> <u>Economic Affairs</u> is the global coordinator of the campaign, defining global key messages and making available outreach resources to countries and other partners through this website. National statistical offices act as national coordinators, translating promotional materials into national languages and organizing events and outreach efforts at national and subnational levels.

INDIAN AIRFORCE DAY

The Indian Air Force (IAF) is the <u>air arm</u> of the <u>Indian Armed</u> Forces. Its complement of personnel and aircraft assets ranks third ^[11] amongst the air forces of the world.^[12] Its primary mission is to secure Indian <u>airspace</u> and to conduct <u>aerial warfare</u> during armed conflict. It was officially established on 8 October 1932 as an auxiliary air force of the <u>British Empire</u> which honoured India's aviation service during World War II with the prefix *Royal*.^[13] After India gained independence from <u>United Kingdom</u> in 1947, the name Royal Indian Air Force was kept and served in the name of <u>Dominion of India</u>..

WORLD MENTAL HEALTH DAY

Growing social and economic inequalities, protracted conflicts, violence and public health emergencies affect whole populations, threatening progress towards improved well-being; a staggering 84 million people worldwide were forcibly displaced during 2021. We must deepen the value and commitment we give to mental health as individuals, communities and governments and match that value with more commitment, engagement and investment by all stakeholders, across all sectors.

Many aspects of mental health have been challenged; and already before the pandemic in 2019 an estimated one in eight people globally were living with a mental disorder. At the same time, the services, skills and funding available for mental health remain in short supply, and fall far below what is needed, especially in low and middle income countries.

Dignity for all in practice is the umbrella theme of the International Day for the Eradication of Poverty for 2022-2023. The dignity of the human being is not only a fundamental right in itself but constitutes the basis of all other fundamental rights. Therefore, "Dignity" is not an abstract concept: it belongs to each and every one. Today, many people living in persistent poverty experience their dignity being denied and disrespected.

With the commitment to <u>end poverty</u>, protect the planet and ensure all people everywhere enjoy <u>peace</u> and prosperity, the <u>2030</u> <u>Agenda</u> again gestured toward the same promise established under the <u>Universal Declaration of Human Rights</u>. Yet, the current reality shows that 1.3 billion people still live in multidimensional poverty with almost half of them children and youth.

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WORLD DEVELOPMENT INFORMATION DAY

An essential part of the work on development consists of the mobilization of public opinion in both developing and developed countries in support of set objectives and policies. Governments of the more advanced countries must continue and intensify their endeavors to deepen public understanding of the inter-dependent nature of development efforts, and of the need to assist the developing countries in accelerating their economic and social progress. Similarly, Governments of developing countries must continue to make people at all levels aware of the benefits and sacrifices involved, and to enlist their full participation in achieving the development goals and objectives.


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WORLD ANESTHESIA DAY

Despite nearly 170 years having passed since that first anaesthetic procedure and the countless breakthroughs that have succeeded it, nearly 5 billion people continue to lack access to safe anaesthesia practices.


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STAR OF THE MONTH


